

OTHER IMPORTANT ISSUES

- Students who ride bikes to school must walk their bikes up the service road on the western side of the school. Bike riders must also wear helmets while riding their bikes








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A Joyous Day as the Government says SORRY





THE WORLD'S GREATEST SHAVE
