I was pleased to see so many parents attend on the first day, and I would extend an invitation to our P&C meetings, which commence on Tuesday 12 February at 7pm in our library. I am sure you will find the meetings informative and give you an insight into the strategic intent of our work both within and beyond the classroom.

Our total enrolment at this point is 1185. There have been many out of area enrolment applications which may, when they are processed, swell this number even further.

I take pleasure in introducing some new staff to the school, including Mr Glenn Smart (Science), Ms Melanie Lever (CAPA) and Ms Michelle Brooks, our new Deputy Principal.

Each of these new people bring to the school significant expertise in both the curricula and extra-curricular domains and I look forward to the contributions they will make to improve student learning outcomes.

We have a number of key priorities in 2013 including the introduction of a new approach to HSC teaching and study in the senior school.

The Study and Response Matrix – STORM - will see a forensic approach to HSC study and preparation that has a proven record of success in moving students into the top bands in the HSC examination. I am genuinely excited by this initiative and remain confident of the capacity it has to ensure the success of our HSC students.

Another key target is a Spelling initiative in Year 7 which will provide direction for future support in this area. We continue to work closely with our primary schools in a Community of Schools partnership that emphasises the learning continuum, K-12.

To support these initiatives, staff have undertaken ongoing Professional Learning which will continue to be a feature of our work.

The introduction of Phase 1 of the Australian Curriculum is scheduled for 2014 and the school has arranged for every member of staff to work with colleagues from 8 other high schools to share resources, programs and understandings relevant to the new syllabus documents.

This is an exciting development and one that I am sure will be successful at our school.

I look forward to working with you in 2013.

# Late To School

If you are late to school you must bring a note and report to the 'Late Office' in 'A' Block, where you fill in one (1) admission slip. After this slip has been signed you are to give it to your classroom teacher. Late arrivals without a note will be recorded. Persistent late arrivals will result in school sanctions including afternoon detentions and school service.

# A STORM is coming......

Storm (Study and Response Matrix) is a HSC writing strategy that aligns study with responding in the HSC. It involves structuring all forms of study - lesson format, note taking, summarising texts, listening to music, interviews, watching clips, conducting experiments, and studying at home in the manner of an ideal HSC extended response (i.e. essay). This is a change from the traditional method of covering content and then tackling a HSC extended response using that content.

The current Year 12 cohort and all staff have been workshopped on the use of STORM. Year 11 will be participating in workshops on Tuesday 12 February. Ongoing support for students, and staff, will be available to further develop the use of this strategy, and not just for Year 11 and Year 12.

The HSC is a culmination of 6 years of high school education. As such the plan is to embed this structure into Stages 4 and 5 in lesson format and, increasingly, in study technique. The goal is to develop, over time, the ability to logically and concisely respond to HSC questions, effectively addressing the complexity of the key verb. Our students will then be more confident and successful, and it is hoped less anxious, when taking on the challenge of the HSC exams.

# Absentee Notices

When providing explanations for school absences, parents are responsible for providing valid reasons for their child's absence. The school is unable to justify an absence based on a broad explanation, i.e.: "Family Reasons" or "Personal Reasons".

As these notes relate to the fulfilling of requirements under the Education Act 1990, absentee notes become a legal document once tendered to the school, and the Principal has the responsibility of validating these notes. As a result, the school is unable to accept the above reasons as a valid reason for student absences.

These absences will be marked down as UNJUSTIFIED absences until an appropriate reason has been given.

The Principals may decline to accept as satisfactory 2.2.4 an explanation for an absence. The parent must be notified that the explanation has not been accepted and a reason for the decision provided

2.2.5 The Principal may request a medical certificate or other documentation where the absences explained as being due to sickness are frequent or prolonged

- Shirts must be buttoned to a socially acceptable height
- Plain means without patterns, stripes, slogans of any kind
  In cold/wet weather any jacket worn must be plain navy

- School shirts **must** be worn under sweat shirts or jumpers

#### A NOTE FROM YOUR PARENT / CAREGIVER IS REQUIRED IF YOU ARE OUT OF UNIFORM

• If a student is unable to wear an item of uniform on any particular day then they must report to the Student Administration Area before 8.25am. The student will be given a uniform exemption note.

Our School's Core Values:

- On the third occasion of reporting without a note an After School Detention will be given.
- An 'out of uniform' student who does not have a uniform exemption note will receive an After School Detention immediately. 'Random checks' are also regularly carried out on assemblies etc.
- Parents or caregivers will be contacted when students are frequently out of uniform without a note from their parents or caregivers.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORT UNIFORMS

Footwear – Sports shoes or joggers must be worn

Shirt – Warilla High School Sports shirt must be worn for PE and Sport

**Shorts -** Plain royal blue (soccer, basketball or rugby style)

NB: Cargo, surf wear or other fashion shorts are not permitted **Tracksuit -** A royal blue tracksuit or the School tracksuit can be worn

Jewellery – No earrings (except studs), rings, bangles or necklaces

**NB:** Sports uniform may be worn **all day** on Thursdays for Sports. You must have a note from a parent / guardian if you are out of uniform or unable to attend PE or Sport.

#### PE LESSONS

Students must change into their PE Uniform before the lesson and change back into their school uniform after the lesson. Students who are out of uniform will still participate in the lesson; however appropriate disciplinary consequences will be enforced. Students who have major difficulty meeting these requirements see Mr Morris to discuss and resolve their problem.

# Welfare

I would like to commend Mr Cairncross for the outstanding job that he has done over the first couple of weeks of the school year as Year 7 Advisor. Year 7 appear to be settling into the routine of high school seamlessly and this is largely due to the efforts of all those who have been involved in our comprehensive school transition program.

Thank you to our Year 10 Peer Support Leaders who attended school a day early in order to partake in a number of activities and assist Year 7 with their orientation into high school. These programs would not be able to take place without talented and dedicated staff overseeing them and we are very fortunate at Warilla High School that Miss Fotheringham and Mr Orange are willing to co-ordinate the Peer Support Program.

On Monday 25 February, Year 7 & 8 are invited to participate in separate Anti-Bullying Workshops which will be taking place at school. Both workshops will be presented by "Bamboo Theatre". The workshops are interactive and will look at the consequences of online actions and provide students with an opportunity to recognise their own behaviour and that of their peers. On the same day a workshop titled "Crisis of a Female Kind" will also be offered to female students in Year 8-12. This workshop will concentrate on image and resilience. Any students wishing to attend any of these workshops need to pay \$5 at the school front office by Friday 22 February. All students will receive permission notes regarding these workshops in the next week.

Our popular after school tutoring service will resume on Tuesday 12 February. All students are welcome to attend and the tutoring is conducted in E21 from 1:45 pm to 3:30 pm. All subjects are catered for in the junior school and any interested senior students need to see Mr Stanizzo to see what subjects are available for them.

A reminder that the school will be once again organising an excursion to the Easter Show. This excursion is offered to Year 7, Year 10 Peer Support Leaders and the SRC. Any Year 7 students intending to attend this excursion will need to earn 5 merit certificates, attend the Anti-Bullying Workshop and have maintained a positive behaviour record.

Mr Cairncross has issued each Year 7 student with a further reminder about the Year 7 Camp which is taking place at the Tops Conference Centre from 8-10 April. The school encourages all students to attend and full payment of \$235 is required by the end of Week 7.

It is important that all students and parents / caregivers notify the school immediately regarding any bullying or harassment issues. All allegations are taken seriously and thoroughly investigated but it makes our jobs difficult if incidents are not being reported.

Congratulations to Holly Kane, Emma O'Neill, Tammy Kennedy, Eloise Neto, Ambia Tzaneros, Heather Currey and Leah Reid who successfully completed a 6 credit point subject titled "Belonging in the Community" at the University of Wollongong over the holidays. This subject will count towards their degree if the students enrol at the University of Wollongong in the Bachelor of Arts in 2014.

Senior students who are driving to school or travelling as passengers in a vehicle being driven by another student are reminded that you need to return the necessary documentation to Mr Stanizzo.
